3	MR. PARKS: I'm going to call this
4	meeting to order at 6:44 p.m.
5	MS. JONES: Fantastic.
6	MR. PARKS: Oh, thank you all for
7	coming. I'm going to quickly close the door a
8	little bit.
9	(Off mic comments)
10	MR. PARKS: So, to answer your
11	question quickly, I will make sure that we are
12	constantly talking to Events DC and making sure
13	that we give great opportunities to our board
14	first.
15	MS. JONES: Yeah, for discounts and
16	everything.
17	MR. PARKS: I'll make sure. The first
18	thing on the agenda, as I pull it up,
19	MS. BROOKS: Oh, is that the
20	residential?
21	MS. JONES: Fantastic.
22	MR. PARKS: So, the first thing on the

1 agenda is welcome and introduction. So, welcome 2 everybody. Thank you for being here. It's going to be a great year. 3 2020. 4 MS. BROOKS: Oh is that the agenda? 5 MR. PARKS: I have it here. But there are only a few things on it. 6 MS. BROOKS: 7 Yes. 8 I will go over things as MR. PARKS: 9 we're going through it. The first thing is the St. Elizabeth's East Campus update. 10 11 Then we're going to do a little review 12 of what you, the Board, noted as your priority 13 and topics. We're going to talk about the summer 14 schedule. And I think I might jump around just 15 16 a little bit, because Mr. Early asked to leave. 17 So, but as a general update, things are going 18 well. 19 MS. JONES: Do I get any paper or 20 anything? 21 MR. PARKS: I thought I gave you one? 22 MS. JONES: No. Oh, this is -- yes.

1	MR. PARKS: Yes. See.
2	MS. JONES: I stuck it in there.
3	MR. PARKS: So, we're moving on. St.
4	Elizabeth's is growing. And we're doing a lot of
5	good things.
6	We did a surplus meeting to make sure
7	that all of the par now that the
8	infrastructure is becoming complete, and we're
9	working on the infrastructure, that's moving
10	towards the new hospital and the new shelter.
11	We are making sure that all the
12	parcels, as soon as we talk to businesses,
13	developers, people who want to do great things on
14	the campus, that the parcels are available to be
15	developed in terms of putting out an RFP and
16	doing a disposition hearing for them.
17	So, for the Entertainment and Sports
18	Arena, there was a ribbon cutting in September
19	2018. The Mystics are doing great. They're
20	champions.
21	We've got the Capital City GoGo
22	developing young men who are, you know, seeking

1 to further their athletic experience in the 2 professional experience. Everything seems to be going really 3 And something on a personal note is that 4 well. 5 there is an International Video Game Tournament coming up in the spring. 6 7 The E-Sports, the District's team is 8 going to be going up against a whole bunch of 9 other teams. And at Overwatch, which is a video 10 game tournament, so that's exciting. 11 MS. JONES: What's the name of the 12 team? 13 MR. PARKS: I'm forgetting the name of 14 the team. 15 MS. JONES: Okay. 16 MR. PARKS: But, they're good. Which 17 is the most important part. 18 MS. JONES: Oh, they are? 19 MR. PARKS: It's new, so we have --20 you know, they haven't become a household name 21 yet, but hopefully they will. 22 And this is, you know, their kind of

1	home base in terms of where the tournament is
2	going to be.
3	Ms. JONES: Okay.
4	MS. BROOKS: Before we leave that, I
5	know that the parade and everything for the
6	Mystics was postponed. Is it going to start from
7	in that, the Entertainment and Sports Arena?
8	MR. PARKS: That's a good question.
9	And I will get back to you on that.
10	MS. JONES: Did you say the parade for
11	what now?
12	MS. BROOKS: For the Mystics. They
13	won a championship.
14	MS. JONES: My goodness.
15	MS. BROOKS: And Sheila didn't want to
16	do it before they left, because there wasn't
17	enough time.
18	Ms. JONES: Okay.
19	MS. BROOKS: So, she said, we're going
20	to do it in the spring.
21	MS. JONES: Yes. I didn't know that.
22	MS. BROOKS: And so I'm saying, is it

1	going to start at the stadium? End at the
2	stadium?
3	I mean, I know most of the parades are
4	down Pennsylvania Avenue. But wouldn't it be
5	nice if instead of parading down Pennsylvania
6	Avenue there was maybe like a party and something
7	right here?
8	MR. PARKS: I like that idea. And I
9	will bring it up to everybody who owns them.
10	MS. JONES: Can I add something to
11	that though?
12	MR. PARKS: Yes.
13	MS. JONES: I kind of think it should
14	be city wide.
15	MR. PARKS: Yes. Of course.
16	MS. JONES: When people think things
17	are here, they think it's Ward Eight or into the
18	river stuff.
19	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
20	MS. JONES: And
21	MS. BROOKS: This is city wide.
22	MS. JONES: Yeah. But, I'm going to

1	tell you what people think. If it's going to be
2	over here, then it's just east of the river.
3	If it was like what they did for the
4	Nationals, they ought to go all out just like for
5	them. They were the first champions.
6	That should be suf if it's not
7	downtown on, what is that, Pennsylvania Avenue?
8	MS. BROOKS: Um-hum.
9	MS. JONES: H Street Northwest, China
10	Town, somewhere in town.
11	Ms. BROOKs: Um-hum.
12	MS. JONES: That's my suggestion.
13	MR. PARKS: And maybe we could merge
14	those two ideas. It should be downtown and have
15	a party here.
16	MS. BROOKS: Yeah. I mean, I hear
17	what you're saying. But, I feel like we have to
18	really push people to know, this is this is
19	their stadium.
20	This is a part of the city. Like they
21	should come and celebrate with
22	MS. JONES: So, you're thinking Martin

1	Luther King?
2	MS. BROOKS: I'm just saying it feels
3	like celebrating it downtown
4	MS. JONES: No, I understand. I was
5	just saying, where do you think it should be?
6	MS. BROOKS: Yeah. I think why
7	not, why not have a parade down MLK? Right?
8	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
9	Ms. JONES: Okay.
10	MS. BROOKS: But I hear what you're
11	saying, white folks are going to be scared about
12	that. And they're going to
13	MS. JONES: Not necessarily against
14	white folks. No, it is not
15	MS. BROOKS: I know, it's a class
16	thing too. I know.
17	MS. JONES: Yeah, yeah.
18	MS. BROOKS: And people are going to
19	feel better on Pennsylvania Avenue. And I'm not
20	denying that they would.
21	But and I do want there to be
22	equity with what the Cavs got and what the

1	Nationals got.
2	MS. JONES: Yeah.
3	MS. BROOKS: But I also think it's a
4	unique opportunity to celebrate a damn near,
5	brand-new arena.
6	MS. JONES: Yep.
7	MS. BROOKS: But I know
8	MR. EARLY: But maybe you could tie
9	into the Anacostia Festival. The festival that
10	is in April.
11	MS. JONES: On the 11th Street Bridge?
12	MR. EARLY: Right. That whole
13	festival is like it starts the second week of
14	April.
15	MS. BROOKS: We could do a whole week
16	with that.
17	MS. JONES: Now that could be yeah.
18	MR. EARLY: Now that takes you down
19	MLK from the intersection in the park all the way
20	down to St to here where we are now.
21	MS. JONES: Um-hum.
22	MR. EARLY: And that was a tie in.

1	MS. JONES: Have a big party in
2	Anacostia Park.
3	MR. EARLY: Yeah. Yeah, you know.
4	And people are going to be over there anyway.
5	MS. JONES: I like that.
6	MR. PARKS: I like the idea.
7	MR. EARLY: So, if it could be
8	targeted for that date. Okay. I've made my
9	contribution.
10	(Laughter)
11	MR. PARKS: So, the Residences,
12	(Off mic comment)
	MR. PARKS: The Residences just opened
13	June of order
13	their first building. So now we have people

2	MR. EARLY: that's great.
3	MR. PARKS: And I think the next two
4	buildings are coming in the next couple of
5	months.
6	And then like I said, throughout the
7	year, they're just going to keep opening the
8	buildings. And keep going through those
9	applications and getting people housed.
10	And at the end of it, probably at the
11	end of this year, towards the beginning of next
12	year, it's going to be 252 units, 202 affordable
13	units.
14	MR. EARLY: Um-hum.
15	MR. PARKS: And lots of those are
16	three bedrooms.
17	MR. EARLY: That's good.
18	MR. PARKS: So, family sized units
19	right by the Metro.
20	MR. EARLY: Right.
21	MR. PARKS: Affordable. And then they
22	have some community space. Latrene and I are

1 going to work on getting more tours started up 2 for people who are interested. 3 So we can see. Because you know, some 4 people will just see it from the outside, and 5 obviously from Alabama, those buildings aren't done yet, so you don't know how great it is. 6 7 MS. JONES: Um-hum. 8 MR. PARKS: But, they're getting done. 9 And they look really great inside. Matchboxes going inside. 10 MS. JONES: 11 MR. PARKS: And so the next part is 12 Gateway Pavilion. So, this ties into what I need 13 some info from you guys. 14 And goes to number four and three on the agenda. Which is what you guys' priorities 15 16 are, and the summer series. 17 MR. EARLY: Okay. 18 MR. PARKS: So, something that we 19 heard from you all, and something that we've been 20 hearing from the community, is we want Whole 21 Foods back. 22 MS. JONES: Yes.

1 MR. PARKS: So, we've started a 2 conversation with Whole Foods. And let them know what we're thinking. 3 Something similar to last time. 4 5 think something that pulled them away before, was 6 they had a really big spread of things that they 7 were offering. 8 And at first it was just, the message 9 was, let's get out into the community. And let's show them what we can do. 10 11 Let's, you know, show them that 12 healthy eating and shopping at Whole Foods can be 13 affordable and healthy for you. That sort of 14 thing. And then they had a little bit of 15 16 change of leadership, and they came in and said, 17 you know, hey, we're not making as much money on 18 this as, you know, we usually do on something 19 else. 20 And so they kind of shied away from 21 So, now we're -- we have people on the

campus. We have a lot more energy and people on

22

1 the campus. 2 So, we're talking to them about the possibility of bringing that back at a little bit 3 of a smaller scale. But still offering things 4 5 like fresh fruit, fresh vegetables, and seafood. And then having that awesome 6 7 experience of getting Whole Foods and a fresh 8 open air market at -- in Congress Heights, by the 9 That sort of thing. Metro. 10 MS. JONES: I'm surprised, but they were running out of stuff. 11 12 MS. BROOKS: Yeah. They sold out 13 often. 14 MS. JONES: I am surprised you said 15 that they weren't making the money. Maybe they 16 were out of affordable products. 17 MR. PARKS: Some days were better then 18 others, you know. So, that's what -- that's what 19 they said. 20 MS. JONES: Okay. 21 MR. PARKS: So, one of the things

we're going to start doing is, the summer series.

22

1 So, last summer, in 2019, which doesn't seem that 2 long ago, but we did some 50 C events, we did some jazz events. 3 4 We're trying to kick that up a notch. 5 Just a notch, and have, you know, a bigger lead 6 into it. 7 Because Latrene had just come in 8 towards the end of March, beginning of April. 9 And so she got that started within like a month and a half. 10 11 MR. EARLY: Um-hum. 12 MR. PARKS: So, now we have a lot more 13 lead in time, and we're going to -- we've been 14 talking to different entities about sponsoring. 15 So, one of the things Latrene said, 16 was she wants you all to think about two things 17 that you want to sponsor as advisory, as the 18 advisory board. 19 And come with ideas about what you --20 what kind of activities and events you might want 21 to have for summer events.

Right now, one of the things that

22

1	they're working on is that we're working on,
2	is kind of like the Fit Fresh Market.
3	Which will incorporate the Fitness
4	Club, which is basically an outdoor workout. I
5	got my workout in.
6	I think I saw you there one time. You
7	got your workout in. And incorporating that with
8	a smaller market.
9	So, you'll have the workout and then
LO	the market. We're trying to pull it all
L1	together. We're going to have some sponsors
<b>L2</b>	there.
L3	So, this would be like a brought to
L <b>4</b>	you by the St. Elizabeth's East Redevelopment
L5	Initiative and sponsor.
L6	MS. JONES: Is there a particular time
L7	you want us to drop advice?
L8	MR. PARKS: Yes. That is an excellent
L9	question. I have the notes right here.
20	So, Latrene said she would like to
21	know what you all are planning to do. And the
22	dates that you would like to do it, by March 15.

1	MS. JONES: Okay.
2	MR. PARKS: And then the calendar will
3	be made public the first of April. And we'll
4	give people notice that it's coming, so people
5	won't think it's an April Fool's joke.
6	MS. BROOKS: All right. So, we give
7	her ideas by March 15. And then we
8	MS. JONES: Oh, by the 15th?
9	MS. BROOKS: Um-hum.
10	MS. JONES: I'm sorry.
11	MS. BROOKS: By March 15 we give her
12	ideas. And maybe we have a couple of target
13	dates in mind
14	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
15	MS. BROOKS: That she could hold, but
16	we don't have to have everything booked by March
17	15.
18	MR. PARKS: Correct.
19	Ms. BROOKs: Okay.
20	MR. EARLY: Are these generally
21	weekends? Weekend dates? Or just dates in
22	general?

1	MR. PARKS: Correct. Saturdays during
2	the summer.
3	MR. EARLY: Saturdays
4	MS. BROOKS: Okay. Saturdays.
5	MR. EARLY: Summer Saturdays.
6	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
7	MR. EARLY: All right.
8	MR. PARKS: So, I wanted to get that
9	message out to you.
10	MR. EARLY: Oh, okay.
11	MS. BROOKS: All right.
12	MR. PARKS: Especially Chris. And
13	I'll continue with my update.
14	MR. EARLY: All right.
15	MR. PARKS: Parcel 17, which was part
16	of the Phase One. Whitman-Walker was announced
17	as one of the main tenants for that building.
18	We asked for a commercial Class A
19	office space. And they're submitting designs.
20	This is the building that they submitted and are
21	working through.
22	So, it's not a final. But they're

1	working through the historic preservation. And
2	then working to get, you know, their building
3	permit.
4	So, that ground breaking should be
5	coming up fairly soon.
6	MS. JONES: I'm sorry, where is this
7	at?
8	MR. PARKS: Right. So, that's right
9	on Alabama, right next to Congress Heights Metro.
10	MS. JONES: Okay. Oh, right on that.
11	MR. EARLY: Oh, right there. Okay.
12	MR. PARKS: That's I mean, before
13	it was kind of a parking lot, staging area for
14	the residences
15	MS. JONES: Yeah, yeah.
16	MR. PARKS: And the Entertainment and
17	Sports Arena. Luckily there's no buildings on
18	it. There's no historic buildings on it.
19	So, we're just working on moving like
20	an electric line.
21	MS. BROOKS: Isn't this the one that
22	we originally, I feel like Red Brick and Cardona,

1	and maybe even the folks from Monument,
2	Monumental Sports, had like a community square
3	and everything?
4	Isn't that isn't this that parcel?
5	MR. PARKS: This is right next to it.
6	MS. BROOKS: Okay. So there's still
7	that in play?
8	MR. PARKS: So this is bigger then you
9	can even imagine. So yeah, that's right across
10	the street from it.
11	There's buildings right across from it
12	that we have to bring down to bring that Parcel
13	15.
14	MS. BROOKS: Fifteen that's it.
15	Fifteen, okay.
16	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
17	MS. BROOKS: That's cool. And this
18	Whitman-Walker thing, I saw the announcement for
19	it.
20	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
21	MS. BROOKS: Is in addition to the
22	hospital maybe moving from Unity or whatever

1	we're calling greater southeast?
2	MR. PARKS: Correct.
3	MS. BROOKS: Okay.
4	MR. PARKS: Correct.
5	MS. JONES: Now it looks quite large.
6	So, is this residential too here?
7	MR. PARKS: There's no residential in
8	the Parcel 17. That's going to be all office and
9	retail and
10	MS. JONES: The Wal oh yeah, the
11	walkman
12	MR. PARKS: Whitman-Walker.
13	MS. JONES: Whitman-Walker, this is,
14	I'm sorry, you said retail?
15	MS. BROOKS: They're going to have
16	most of the building. There's only going to be
17	retail in some of this.
18	MR. PARKS: Whitman-Walker is a health
19	clinic kind of
20	(Simultaneous speaking)
21	MR. PARKS: Yeah. And so there's
22	you can see there's like, it says DC Cap Arena,

1	it's just a placeholder obviously.
2	But, there are going to be retail
3	probably on the bottom, and then office on the
4	top.
5	MS. BROOKS: Yeah. Because they've
6	outgrown their spot on MLK. So, they're trying
7	to bring all those people here too.
8	MR. PARKS: So, I think maybe think
9	about just from my experience, on F Street
10	where close to by the Marriott, they have
11	those kind of food court area.
12	And then there's offices on top behind
13	the hotel. So, think on the downtown area.
14	MR. EARLY: If you think about it
15	MR. PARKS: But on a smaller scale.
16	
	MR. EARLY: This is a rendering. So,

1	MR. PARKS: In the long term, their
2	plan is to have two buildings.
3	MR. EARLY: Oh, really? Okay.
4	MR. PARKS: So, they have the current
5	zoning to do one. And they're going to proceed
6	on that because they've got the tenant for it.
7	MR. EARLY: Um-hum.
8	MR. PARKS: And then later on they're
9	going to try to do the other.
10	MS. JONES: This is Slash Hospital.
11	MS. BROOKS: But both buildings won't
12	be Whitman-Walker?
13	MR. PARKS: Just one.
14	MS. BROOKS: Just one building is
15	Whitman-Walker. Yeah.
16	MR. EARLY: Okay.
17	MS. BROOKS: But two buildings from
18	Red Brick.
19	MR. EARLY: Got it.
20	MR. PARKS: So yeah. We've got some
21	zoning stuff on that first stool, and some site
22	work to do on it before vertical construction.

1	But, as you can see, they're starting
2	the design and getting it approved. And that's
3	not cheap.
4	So, the work is going to continue.
5	MS. BROOKS: It helps that there's
6	nothing on the space right now.
7	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Exactly. So, I
8	also wanted to give an update on the interim St.
9	E's new men's shelter.
10	So they are going to be constructing
11	a new men's shelter. I'm on the advisory team
12	for that.
13	So, I get the first look at what's
14	going up. They went before the Commission of
15	Fine Arts and HPRB and NPCE, to get all their
16	historic stuff taken care of.
17	There is a lot of back and forth. I
18	think they're going back one more time with their
19	final, and then moving forward.
20	And in the meantime, they're going to
21	work towards getting their site work done.
22	Because it's kind of further back on the campus.

1	If you look back to the first, the
2	second slide.
3	MS. BROOKS: It's closer to the
4	stables. They're at
5	MR. PARKS: Yes. It's right behind
6	the stables.
7	MS. BROOKS: From that end by Hasima
8	(phonetic).
9	MR. PARKS: So, I'll give you it's
10	right, it's going to be right here, in this
11	little box.
12	MS. BROOKS: Yep. Yeah.
13	MR. PARKS: It's going to be right
14	here.
15	MR. EARLY: Okay, so it right here.
16	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Right. So,
17	that's right behind the horse stable. It's going
18	to be further, a little further north, close to
19	UCC.
20	MS. BROOKS: I'm sorry. I was calling
21	that Hasima, but it's not Hasima.
22	(Simultaneous speaking)

1	MR. PARKS: Hasima?
2	MS. BROOKS: I thought yeah.
3	MR. PARKS: The building is called
4	DCC.
5	MS. BROOKS: the DCCima building is
6	right there, yeah.
7	MR. PARKS: Right. The agency is
8	called HCima (phonetic). They also have EMS and
9	all that.
10	MS. JONES: I do have a question
11	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Go ahead.
12	MS. JONES: About the overnight
13	shelter transitional. Is it seniors?
14	MR. PARKS: Right. Um-hum, yes.
15	MS. JONES: So it's seniors in there?
16	MR. PARKS: Yes. So there's yes to
17	everything. It's three different it's going
18	to be three different buildings.
19	It kind of looks like one. And it's
20	supposed to look cohesive. But this is one, two,
21	and three.
22	MS. JONES: OH, for a homeless center.

1	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
2	MS. JONES: Oh, okay.
3	MS. BROOKS: All this is homeless
4	men's shelter.
5	MR. PARKS: Yes. This is a homeless
6	shelter.
7	MS. JONES: All men's homeless
8	shelters. Okay.
9	MR. PARKS: And but they have
10	different kind of barrier levels. So, there's a
11	low barrier shelter, that means pretty much
12	anyone from the street can walk in, and come in
13	and get a bed.
14	And then there's going to be some kind
15	of more transitional housing. People who, you
16	know, are working. And are a little bit further
17	along in their development. And just don't have
18	a home yet.
19	And then there's going to be some
20	space for senior homeless people. And so, it's
21	going to be really nice.
22	I can bring back in the next meeting,

1	I can bring back some additional members of this.
2	MS. JONES: And maybe bring the
3	seniors, please.
4	MR. PARKS: Yeah.
5	MS. JONES: Yeah, I belong to Congress
6	Heights Wellness Center.
7	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
8	MS. JONES: And aware. And the
9	council members informed us that there was some
10	new housing coming up for seniors.
11	MR. PARKS: Right.
12	MS. JONES: And I'm hoping this is not
13	it.
14	MR. PARKS: No. This is not the same.
15	MS. JONES: Okay. This is not what
16	they're talking about.
17	MR. PARKS: Yeah.
18	MS. JONES: Okay.
19	MR. PARKS: Yeah, everything here is
20	temporary and transitional. But, besides the low
21	barrier shelter area, which is the bigger
22	building on the left, it's supposed to be a lot

1	more supportive.
2	There's going to be additional
3	programming that goes along with it.
4	MS. JONES: Wrap around services.
5	MR. PARKS: Right.
6	MS. JONES: Okay.
7	MR. PARKS: And what was the last
8	thing I was going to say? That it's a little
9	more long term then the low barrier one.
10	You're basically guaranteed your bed
11	back.
12	MS. JONES: Right. And that's good,
13	they're going to have shelter.
14	MR. PARKS: Besides the low barrier,
15	yes.
16	MS. JONES: But tell me, what about
17	what about women?
18	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Well, there are
19	a few other women and family shelters. And those
20	are the ones, there are a couple being built or
21	have been built recently that are replacing DC
22	Joe.

1	MS. JONES: Yeah, I'm not talking
2	about families. Just single, single single
3	female seniors?
4	MR. PARKS: Yeah. Those people can go
5	into the women it's women and families. So, -
6	-
7	MS. JONES: Oh, they put women with
8	the single women with the families.
9	MR. PARKS: Right. So, that covers
10	that. So, in terms of St. E's, this men's
11	shelter is going to be built.
12	And it's going to be much bigger then
13	the one that's currently there before they
14	demolished the current one that's there.
15	MS. JONES: Oh, have they already
16	demolished this one?
17	MR. PARKS: No, they haven't.
18	MS. JONES: All right.
19	MR. PARKS: So, they're going to do
20	the site work and work on this through the next -
21	_
22	MS. JONES: So what's the dates on it?

1	Is it time lined?
2	MR. PARKS: Right. So, I think
3	they're trying to break ground in the next month
4	or two.
5	MS. JONES: Okay.
6	MR. PARKS: So, I'm just going to say
7	by mid April they should have broken ground, I
8	think.
9	And then they're going to keep
LO	working. I don't remember the exact end date.
L1	And obviously before you start, it's difficult to
L2	say exactly when they're going to end.
L3	But, sometime before it's the end of
L <b>4</b>	the year next year, I'm thinking.
L5	Ms. JONES: Okay.
L6	MR. PARKS: But yeah, it's going to be
L7	really nice. And I was happily surprised. The
L8	Department of Behavioral Health and the
L9	Department of Health are pretty involved in this
20	process.
21	Making sure that all the lessons
22	learned in the past five to ten years are being

fully accounted for. And so, --1 2 MS. JONES: Yeah. That's good. Three hundred and fifty-3 MS. BROOKS: 4 six beds. 5 MR. PARKS: Um-hum. And that includes 6 the overnight shelter, transitional, and seniors. 7 So, lots to look forward to with that. 8 Hello. Welcome. 9 MS. BUNN: Hi. How's it going? 10 MR. PARKS: So, we're just going 11 through the campus update. One of the things 12 that I had said before is Latrene said she would 13 like ideas from the Advisory Board on summer 14 activities that the Advisory Board could sponsor 15 for summer weekends. 16 And I said the update is we're now 17 talking to many entities about summer series, 18 summer Saturdays, besides just the 50 C, having 19 fun things for people to come to the campus and 20 learn more about what's going on, and get fit. 21 That sort of thing. 22 (Off mic comment)

1	MR. PARKS: You can have this one.
2	MS. BUNN: Why thank you. How sweet.
3	MS. JONES: James, I'd like to have
4	I'd like to see an agenda update.
5	MR. PARKS: Okay.
6	MS. JONES: Because it's a record for
7	me.
8	MR. PARKS: Yes.
9	MR. EARLY: This doesn't work for you
10	now?
11	MR. JONES: Not that. Thank you. I
12	appreciate it. We've got
13	(Laughter and simultaneous speaking)
14	MR. PARKS: So yeah. Ms. Bunn, I was
15	just talking about the new shelter.
16	MS. BUNN: Um-hum.
17	MR. PARKS: We've got a great new
18	shelter coming. I'm on the advisory team for it.
19	So, I get the information first hand.
20	So, if you have any questions, talk to
21	me. Because I won't feel really, I'll get back
22	to you.

1	MS. BUNN: What's the slated opening
2	date?
3	MR. PARKS: The slated opening date?
4	I'm not exactly sure. I can get back to you on
5	that.
6	MS. BUNN: Okay.
7	MR. PARKS: But, they are supposed to
8	start the construction this spring, in the next -
9	_
10	MS. BUNN: This spring. Okay.
11	MR. PARK: I would say month and a
12	half. Yeah. They have some site work to do.
13	But, after they do, you know, move the ground
14	around a little bit, they're going to start
15	building up.
16	So, it's going to be three buildings.
17	There's going to be a low barrier shelter for
18	people just walking in off the street.
19	MS. BUNN: Um-hum.
20	MR. PARKS: There's going to be kind
21	of a workforce building, for people who are
22	working but just don't, you know, have an income

but just have a home yet. 1 2 And then a place for seniors. It will be, you know, a little more low key, but still 3 with the same services. And it will be a little 4 5 bit more long term care and wrap around services. So, DBH and DMHHS are very heavily 6 involved in making sure that they've learned from 7 8 their experience over the last five to ten years 9 as we've been working, you know, the DC government has been working really hard on making 10 sure that the most vulnerable residents have the 11 12 services and assets that they need. 13 MS. JONES: The services are the key 14 thing. I'm telling you. 15 MR. PARKS: And access that they need. 16 MS. BUNN: Exactly. 17 MR. PARKS: So, this new shelter is 18 going to be a lot better then what's currently 19 there. 20 And obviously they're going to build 21 the new one and move everybody in before they

tear this current one down to make way for the

22

1	hospital facility.
2	MS. JONES: Tell me, where did those
3	people go that was under the bridge over there?
4	MR. PARKS: The K Street bridge?
5	MS. JONES: Yeah.
6	MR. PARKS: That's an excellent
7	question. I don't have an answer for that.
8	MS. JONES: Do you know where they
9	went?
10	MS. BUNN: Wherever they could find,
11	they stay.
12	MS. JONES: Wow.
13	MR. PARKS: Yeah. But, I'm here to
14	try to make sure that we're building you know,
15	the Mayor is trying to build affordable housing
16	by 2026.
17	So, that's what we're here to do.
18	Make sure we're making a place where the barriers
19	are low.
20	MR. EARLY: Um-hum.
21	MR. PARKS: And we are giving people
22	who are already here opportunities that anybody

1 would want. Right. 2 MS. JONES: So, she's given up on the tiny house at this time. 3 4 MR. PARKS: I just -- I don't know if 5 that's your policy on tiny house. (Laughter) 6 MR. PARKS: But, so yeah, that's 7 8 what's going on with the shelter. Things are 9 moving on pretty well. That isn't it. But, there is a 10 11 rendering in there with the close to finished 12 design, before they come out to the community for 13 the last input, to make sure that everybody 14 doesn't think it's a total eyesore. 15 MS. JONES: They didn't say that. 16 MR. PARKS: But, it looks really -- I 17 It looks dynamic. think it looks really nice. Ι 18 think it looks like it connects to the rest of 19 the campus. It doesn't look like a shelter. 20 21 know, what you usually traditionally think like a

22

shelter.

1	(Simultaneous speaking)
2	MR. PARKS: I think it looks, you
3	know, like a new DC government building.
4	MS. JONES: Yeah.
5	MR. PARKS: Right? And so that's what
6	you kind of what to give the feel of. You don't
7	want people to walk in feeling like oh, this is
8	where I belong.
9	You want to feel like, hey, I'm going
10	home, for now. As I transition.
11	MR. EARLY: Yeah. Um-hum.
12	MR. PARKS: But yeah. That's just my
13	little share with that because I'm on the
14	advisory team.
15	But, those are the things. We're
16	making some headway there. We signed the LDA.
17	We're going to have hotel, office, retail, town
18	square, residential there.
19	The first thing
20	MS. JONES: You're not going to name
21	the hotel James Bunn building, hotel?
22	MR. PARKS: Hey, put it on the table.

1	All they can say is maybe.
2	MS. JONES: I was around when he had
3	when he kept it that.
4	MS. BUNN: Yeah. Nobody else was
5	talking about a hotel but him.
6	MS. JONES: He sure was.
7	MR. PARKS: Yeah. In terms of naming,
8	I mean, if it's not the whole hotel itself, all
9	of them, right. The speciality, penthouse room,
10	something.
11	(Simultaneous speaking)
12	MR. PARKS: I like it. I'm down for
13	that.
14	MS. JONES: Yeah.
15	MR. EARLY: Name the town square.
16	MR. PARKS: Right.
17	MR. EARLY: The Bunn town the James
18	Bunn town square. Or something like that.
19	MR. PARKS: Put it out there.
20	MS. JONES: Did I miss or where is
21	
22	MR. EARLY: Where it says town square.

MR. JONES: 1 Oh, town square, yeah. 2 MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Right. So, there's going to be open space. The first thing 3 4 I should tell you is coming up in the spring, 5 we're going to have -- what is it, kind of a modular space and interim retail on Parcel 15. 6 Right now they can't get started 7 8 immediately with the construction because there's 9 two buildings there. And we have to raise them in order to create this great development plan 10 11 that we have. 12 MS. JONES: So they're not historic 13 buildings obviously. 14 MR. PARKS: They are technically 15 historic buildings. But, they're the exact same 16 design as all of the residences that are being 17 saved. 18 MS. JONES: Um-hum. 19 MR. PARKS: So, in the master plan it 20 contemplates that those will go down. Because 21 the way the views are set up, once Parcel 17 gets

built up, you won't really be able to see Parcel

22

1	15. And it's kind of towards the back.
2	MS. JONES: Okay.
3	MR. PARKS: Once those buildings are
4	up. So, the views aren't exactly the same from
5	Alabama.
6	MS. JONES: Um-hum.
7	MR. PARKS: And they're the exact same
8	architectural design, so.
9	Ms. JONES: Right.
10	MR. PARKS: We're going to put those
11	down. They're already using some of the roof
12	tiles on there for the residences, to make those
13	beautiful.
14	MS. JONES: Oh, okay.
15	MR. PARKS: And so, we're going to
16	save, you know, some of the aspects of it to use
17	on other buildings where we can.
18	MS. JONES: Sure. So this was awarded
19	last year?
20	MR. PARKS: Yes.
21	MS. BROOKS: So, just to be clear,
22	these are the two buildings that are Parcel 17?

1	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Those white
2	buildings, yeah.
3	MS. BROOKS: And so this is the one
4	of them is Whitman-Walker.
5	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
6	MS. BROOKS: And that's what's
7	blocking the view of the rest of the parcel.
8	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
9	MS. BROOKS: And this is the
10	Entertainment and Sports Arena, right?
11	MR. PARKS: Correct.
12	MS. BROOKS: And these are the
13	residences?
14	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
15	Ms. BROOKs: Okay. Got it.
16	MR. PARKS: Exactly. And obviously
17	these are preliminary. But just so you get a
18	sense of the scale and the orient, potential
19	orientation of how it's going.
20	Ms. BROOKs: Sure.
21	MR. PARKS: Obviously right now you
22	look at it, and it's like, oh, there's a parking

1	lot there. Oh, there's two buildings there.
2	But, when you look at it like this,
3	you realize it's huge.
4	MS. BROOKS: Yeah.
5	MR. PARKS: There's a lot of potential
6	there. Especially when you think about all the
7	jobs that can go in there for the office and the
8	hotel and their retail and restaurants.
9	Because they were saying they had
10	partnered with restaurants. So, hopefully we
11	will get at least two or three in there.
12	I'm hoping it will bring like a
13	Silver, downtown Silver Spring kind of vibe.
14	Where people will be really excited to just pop
15	out of the Metro and see it.
16	And then look at their homes through
17	that pathway to the residences. And then go see
18	a basketball game and see the Mystics win.
19	And it will be a whole DC/Congress
20	Heights experience. That's my hope.
21	
	MS. JONES: That would be great.

1	MR. PARKS: Yes?
2	MS BUNN: For the resident center,
3	sorry to go back.
4	MR. PARKS: No, that's okay.
5	MS. BUNN: Are those totally leased
6	up? Do you know?
7	MR. PARKS: The first building is.
8	But, they haven't leased out the ones that
9	haven't been completely renovated yet.
10	MS. BROOKS: But once that's built
11	across from them
12	MS. BUNN: So they have a waiting
13	list.
14	MR. PARKS: So they have a waiting
15	list. And then they probably have the next two
16	buildings that are about to be done in the first
17	they're probably figuring out exactly that
18	make up.
19	MS. BUNN: Right.
20	MR. PARKS: Obviously it's not done
21	until it's all built and you can see you place
22	and move in.

1 But, they're probably accepting 2 applications and making sure, you know, they have all their credit deposits in order, so that when 3 4 that comes up, they're ready to move in. 5 And they can say hey, only two weeks 6 after we open this, we had three-quarters of the 7 people moved in already. 8 MS. BUNN: Okay. And you are saying 9 that possibly in the spring there's going to be modular spaces? 10 11 MR. PARKS: Um-hum. That's the 12 interim retail. 13 MS. BUNN: Okay. 14 MR. PARKS: So, we're going to have -right now the parking lot is there. While we're 15 16 working on getting the raise permit for the two 17 buildings that are there, we're going to have --18 we don't want it to just sit. 19 We want something to be going on. 20 Especially with an adjacent sports arena there. 21 Especially with people living there now. 22 We want them to be able to do

something. Say how great it is. Get more people 1 2 here. So, they're working on getting 3 4 partners and tenants for modular space. They've 5 -- I mean, I went to California, and they had like a -- obviously it's not going to be the same 6 7 exactly. 8 But, they had like a Samsung temporary 9 popup retail station. And they had performers. And they had, you know, street parties. 10 11 MS. BUNN: Um-hum. 12 MR. PARKS: And they had people inside 13 doing things, promotions, some other things, so. 14 MS. BROOKS: Yeah. That would be I mean, right now it would be great to 15 16 have something to do before the game. Right? 17 MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Um-hum. 18 MS. BROOKS: A place to eat. 19 MR. PARKS: Yeah. And that's been --20 that was one of the main things that Shrarosh 21 (phonetic), our real estate director was like, we need food there as a constant and consistent 22

1	thing.
2	So, and once the modular space is
3	there, I'm sure we'll get feedback from the
4	community about hey, why don't we have this? And
5	then we're like, okay guys, get on it.
6	That's what we'd like.
7	MR. EARLY: Um-hum.
8	MR. PARKS: So yeah, those are the
9	things to look forward to. Let me see.
10	MS. JONES: You know, James, did you
11	get a copy of the you remember I had did a
12	survey of people living in my community, of what
13	they would like to see here?
14	MR. PARKS: If you can resend it to
15	me, I will take a look at it.
16	MS. JONES: I sent it to what's her
17	name again?
18	MR. PARKS: Latrene.
19	MS. JONES: Latrene.
20	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Okay.
21	MS. JONES: Recently I sent it to her
22	

1	MR. PARKS: Okay. Yeah, send it to me
2	too.
3	MS. JONES: And I thought it would be
4	on there, it would be on the agenda.
5	MR. PARKS: So, the townhomes. So, we
6	passed a text amendment with the Zoning Board
7	with the developer. And so that was just about
8	like curb cuts and stuff.
9	They wanted to be able to have their
10	alleyways behind it so it doesn't have to be like
11	trash in front. That sort of thing.
12	So, the townhomes are coming soon.
13	The Mayor is very excited about it and pushing
14	for us to get a ground breaking done.
15	So, we are working on getting a ground
16	breaking done some time this summer.
17	MS. JONES: Watch out. I was at a
18	meeting, a Congress Heights meeting yesterday.
19	And a group was there to talk about alleys.
20	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
21	MS. JONES: Have you heard of them?
22	They want to put graffiti. They really kind of

1	want to block, I don't know how they do that.
2	It's to help with people that left
3	their trash cans back there. I don't have an
4	alley.
5	MR. PARKS: Sometimes.
6	MS. JONES: And, I mean, it just seems
7	like they want to take over alleys in the city.
8	They're doing it up in Shaw.
9	MS. BUNN: They're kind of commercial
10	statement.
11	MS. JONES: No. It's residential.
12	MR. PARKS: Interesting.
13	MS. JONES: They said that's public
14	land.
15	MS. BUNN: But they said they do what?
16	MS. JONES: They put graffiti.
17	MS. BUNN: But that's what I'm saying.
18	This
19	MS. JONES: I guess just some
20	activities.
21	MS. BUNN: But they'd be doing that on
22	the back if in the residential.

1	MS. JONES: That's what I thought
2	then. I just want to say, be careful.
3	MR. PARKS: Okay.
4	MS. BROOKS: I mean, is it just some
5	murals? I mean, I'm not opposed to a really
6	pretty mural in my alley.
7	But I don't want like
8	MS. BUNN: But if they're
9	(Simultaneous speaking)
10	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
11	MS. BROOKS: I said the same thing.
12	MS. BUNN: That's interesting.
13	MR. PARKS: See, at town halls there
14	should be they're working with DHCD to make
15	sure they're complying with all of the
16	requirements for affordability.
17	So, I think there's going to be
18	somewhere between 13 and 15 each above 80 percent
19	and 60 percent varying median income. And then
20	the rest will be, I mean, it's like out of either
21	88 or 90 townhomes.
22	MS. BROOKS: Yeah. It should be up to

1	90. And then it's hard to read because it's
2	white. Is this 15 percent?
3	I'm assuming that it's 15 and 15,
4	right?
5	MR. EARLY: Yeah.
6	MR. PARKS: Yes. So, those are coming
7	up. Home ownership opportunities, as I said, the
8	mayor is very excited about it.
9	So, we're pushing the developer to
10	make sure that they are getting their designs
11	done. And working with DHDD to get their, you
12	know, requirements. And DCRA to get their
13	permits.
14	Get it going.
15	MS. BROOKS: Okay. So that's maybe
16	30, about 30 units that would be for affordable
17	housing?
18	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Um-hum.
19	MS. BROOKS: Okay.
20	MR. PARKS: Right across from the
21	residences. Which is 80 percent affordable.
22	MR. BROOKS: Right. And there will be

1	amenities.
2	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
3	MS. BROOKS: Groovy.
4	MR. PARKS: Yeah. So, are there any
5	ideas off the top of you guys' heads about what
6	you might want to sponsor, ideas for this summer?
7	MS. JONES: Summer, what if like about
8	a splash park? Is there such a thing as a pop up
9	splash park?
10	You can have different fun games for
11	the whole family? I know the children have those
12	little things, but if there's something also for
13	adults?
14	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Um-hum.
15	MS. BUNN: What about a wait, along
16	those lines like a I don't know, I forgot the
17	word, like a game night or something?
18	MR. PARKS: Okay.
19	MS. BUNN: You know, legos are big
20	with kids. Like have legos.
21	MR. PARKS: Yes, they are. And the
22	bigger

1	MS. BUNN: You know, there are game
2	trucks that have all types of games that people
3	can play.
4	MR. PARKS: That's true.
5	MS. BUNN: So, making it like a family
6	fun game night or something like that?
7	MS. JONES: And a maze. What about
8	those mazes?
9	MS. BUNN: Um-hum.
10	MS. JONES: I think like that would be
11	fun.
12	MS. BUNN: Yeah. Are you what
13	about the movie thing. Is that happening again?
14	MR. PARKS: I can talk to events to
15	see. But, I think so.
16	MS. BUNN: Okay. Because that was
17	pretty cool having the family meet for movie
18	night.
19	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
20	MS. BUNN: And what about some type
21	of, I don't know, like the mini art all night?
22	Like it's a creative night. You know, poetry

1	poetry readings, you know poetry slams.
2	MS. JONES: Vendors with
3	(Simultaneous speaking)
4	MS. BUNN: You know, having some
5	vendors selling their wares or whatever.
6	MS. JONES: Um-hum.
7	MS. BUNN: Something like that.
8	MR. PARKS: I like that.
9	MS. BROOKS: They used to do do you
10	remember Art-O-Matic?
11	MS. BUNN: Um-hum.
12	MS. BROOKS: They used to do that.
13	And that would be kind of it was it was
14	really cool, even though that it was often inside
15	of that old Manhattan Laundry.
16	But, which was kind of a funky
17	building. But, that would be something cool to
18	do outside. Maybe people are painting.
19	MS. BUNN: Um-hum.
20	MS. BROOKS: And sculpting or
21	whatever. I think that would be cool.

1	MS. BROOKS: Yeah. You could buy some
2	art and you could participate in some art.
3	(Simultaneous speaking)
4	MS. BUNN: An oversized finger
5	painting.
6	MS. BROOKS: Yeah. I like that idea.
7	An oversized finger painting.
8	MS. BUNN: Um-hum.
9	MS. BROOKS: The kids are finger
10	painting
11	MS. BUNN: And then the adults can sit
12	there and paint.
13	(Simultaneous speaking)
14	MR. EARLY: Same thing as
15	(Simultaneous speaking)
16	MS. BROOKS: Pass out little aprons or
17	old things that everybody can put over their own
18	and keep clean.
19	MS. BUNN: And you said that Fit DC is
20	going to help us?
21	MR. PARKS: Yep. Fit DC, help us

1	MS. BUNN: And that was just for one
2	day?
3	MR. PARKS: It was we did three of
4	them.
5	(Simultaneous speaking)
6	MR. PARKS: Yeah. I mean, they
7	brought the energy. And they brought some music.
8	That music was keeping that was the only thing
9	that was keeping me going.
10	(Simultaneous speaking)
11	MS. JONES: Yeah. Those are all good
12	ideas.
13	MS. BUNN: I think there's a start.
14	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Um-hum.
15	MS. BUNN: All right.
16	MR. EARLY: Good to see you now.
17	MR. PARKS: If you could let the court
18	reporter know your name and permission before you
19	go. So that he can write it down.
20	MR. EARLY: Yes.
21	MS. JONES: What about something we
22	can put our fingerprint on?

	MR. PARKS: Um-num.
2	MS. JONES: Something that's kind of
3	permanent around here.
4	MS. BROOKS: Well, I'm wondering, I
5	mean, if we did some either one of these.
6	Like the game night I like. I like the family
7	splash thing. I like the creative arts' thing.
8	If it was something that we sponsored
9	every year, or something that could then
10	translate, like once they have the town square,
11	it would be cool to have it moved to the town
12	square or the Gateway Arch Pavilion, and just be
13	a, something that people know is going to happen.
14	MR. PARKS: Yeah.
15	MS. JONES: The only thing is, I think
16	my term is up. What are they? Two years?
17	MR. PARKS: You know, if you want to
18	stay with the team, talk to them about doing
19	MS. BROOKS: I've been on it eight
20	years now. So, I think you've got to keep going.
21	And I didn't even realize it existed.
22	MS. JONES: Yeah. I don't know. I

1	was just wondering. I didn't know if that was
2	the Mayor's call. To have confidence of. She
3	wants this. You might as well break it down,
4	they keep hounding me.
5	MR. PARKS: You know, the Mayor's
6	office for talent and appointments are the main
7	people working at it. So,
8	MS. JONES: Okay. I just thought
9	MR. PARKS: And they usually ask me.
10	Like hey, who is coming to the meetings? Have
11	they been like participating? So.
12	MS. JONES: Okay. Well, something
13	like that would be kind of a, I don't know.
14	Maybe some of the art projects, sculpture
15	projects.
16	MR. PARKS: So we're feeling the
17	artistic creative.
18	MS. JONES: It could be part of the
19	town center.
20	MS. BROOKS: Right. And then you
21	know, they know that something from whatever the
22	arts' event will then get installed on the

1	campus.
2	MR. PARKS: Yeah. I like that.
3	MS. BROOKS: Wouldn't that be nice?
4	That we are creating art that permanently stays
5	on the campus? I like that.
6	MR. EARLY: All right you all.
7	MS. BROOKS: Take care.
8	MS. JONES: See you Chris.
9	MR. EARLY: Okay. See you all later.
10	MS. JONES: All right. Chris with the
11	grey beard.
12	MR. EARLY: Old age.
13	MS. JONES: It looks good on you.
14	MR. EARLY: Thank you.
15	(Simultaneous speaking)
16	MS. BROOKS: Those are sliders. I've
17	run into them. That's why.
18	MS. JONES: What are they doing over
19	there?
20	MR. PARKS: That's a Pepco meeting.
21	MS. BROOKS: They're talking about the
22	new multi-year plan for transparency and

1	accountability.
2	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
3	MS. BROOKS: I was nosey, so I went
4	over and asked them.
5	MR. PARKS: Well, they had to be
6	transparent then.
7	MS. BROOKS: Yeah.
8	MR. PARKS: Okay. So yeah. Is there
9	any new business that we would like to discuss
10	for St. Elizabeth's?
11	Any questions that I can either answer
12	here or come back to you with the answers to it?
13	MS. JONES: Well, I'd like for you all
14	to read the list.
15	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
16	MS. JONES: I know, people are asking
17	me, saying why were you asking me what we thought
18	we needed up at St. Elizabeth's three years ago?
19	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
20	MS. JONES: I want to be able to say,
21	hey, look they're still looking at it. So,
22	something.

1	MR. PARKS: Um-hum.
2	MS. BUNN: Oh, I didn't get a chance
3	to read the article, but I read something about
4	there's a sponsor for the ESA?
5	MR. PARKS: I don't know.
6	MS. BROOKS: Yes.
7	MS. BUNN: Who's the sponsor?
8	MS. BROOKS: It is RCN.
9	MS. BUNN: Oh.
10	MS. BROOKS: So, they are going to be
11	the internet sponsor for the arena. You know, so
12	all the internet is going to be RCN.
13	And then they'll have some type of
14	naming. And then somehow it also covers, I guess
15	because it's Monumental Sports, it means that
16	they also are going to be the internet provider
17	for like the outside, around the other stadium
18	and et cetera.
19	And they're around this stadium and
20	(Simultaneous speaking)
21	MS. BROOKS: They are not like the
22	named sponsor for the arena though. They didn't

1	come in at that level.
2	MS. JONES: Oh, all right. So they're
3	not like Verizon.
4	MS. BUNN: Okay. They won't be the
5	RCN
6	Ms. BROOKs: No.
7	MS. JONES: Okay. Good. I wasn't
8	sure.
9	MS. BROOK: But they'll be like, you
LO	know, somewhere on the buil you know,
L1	somewhere inside you'll see it.
L2	MS. BUNN: Well, that would be great
L3	if they did I mean, are they doing no,
L <b>4</b>	they're just doing the internet access for the
L5	stadium.
L6	But it would be cool if they could
L <b>7</b>	make sure everybody in this community had high
L8	speed internet.
L9	MS. BROOKS: Yeah.
20	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. The good thing
21	is, with the new infrastructure, all of those,
22	you know, data lines and stuff are brand new, and
	$\Pi$

1	fire safe.
2	MS. JONES: Well, wasn't it
3	MS. BUNN: What about
4	(Simultaneous speaking)
5	MS. BUNN: Are they building a cell
6	tower somewhere with that? Because you can build
7	all the files you want, but if you don't have the
8	corresponding towers.
9	MR. PARKS: I don't know about from
10	the phone perspective. But, we are working with
11	Verizon.
12	MS. BUNN: For the internet I thought
13	that we talked about everybody ought to be able
14	to get on the internet in the city.
15	It's somewhere up northwest, isn't it?
16	That they have the ability, people have the
17	ability to get on internet?
18	I don't know. I don't know the linko,
19	or the lingo, or whatever you call it. I'm not
20	that cool with this.
21	MS. BROOKS: It depends on your
22	community. Because you have, I have, I mean, I

1	live in Ward Five. And not every provider comes
2	to my neighborhood.
3	So, it's like, well, you can get
4	you can get Direct TV and internet to Direct TV,
5	but you can't get RCN or et cetera.
6	So, some of them are down different
7	lines.
8	MS. JONES: They're not building them
9	under the street? You haven't heard this? You
10	know, people ought to be able to get on the
11	internet.
12	If you're walking down the street and
13	tune in. Have you heard about that?
14	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Yes.
15	MS. JONES: So, that's is that off
16	the table?
17	MR. PARKS: I wouldn't say off the
18	table. They're supposed to be, you know, a new
19	great interest.
20	Ms. JONES: Oh, good.
21	MR. PARKS: But, I don't think it's
22	necessarily part of the infrastructure to have

1	that yet. But
2	MS. JONES: Oh.
3	MR. PARKS: But, as technology
4	improves, I think those are things that we'll be
5	looking for.
6	And looking for developers when we put
7	out RFPs to respond to. Like how are you going
8	to make accessible digital lines, telephone
9	lines, that kind of thing.
10	MS. JONES: Do they have that in
11	Silver Spring? Up in that big circle they have?
12	MR. PARKS: I'm not sure.
13	MS. JONES: Oh, you don't know?
14	MR. PARKS: I'm not sure. I'll look
15	into it though.
16	MS. BUNN: I have another idea for the
17	summer.
18	MR. PARKS: Okay.
19	MS. BUNN: Why not do a family supper
20	night? Or something like that.
21	MR. PARKS: Okay.
22	MS. BUNN: Or something they came to.

1	Does everybody meet dinner en blanc.
2	MR. PARKS: Yes.
3	MS. JONES: Dinner on the block?
4	MR. PARKS: No.
5	MS. BUNN: No, dinner en blanc.
6	MR. PARKS: It's like a white party.
7	MS. BUNN: It's in like in so
8	there's a secret location. And those that are
9	invited to participate, you bring I mean, you
10	bring your own
11	MS. JONES: Potluck?
12	MS. BUNN: Table attire or that kind
13	of thing. But, it is such a beautiful
14	experience. Like
15	MS. JONES: Oh, I saw that on TV one
16	time. With long tables and with the white table
17	clothes.
18	MS. BUNN: Yes. And you know, you
19	don't have to do white. We could do all black.
20	We could do, you know, whatever. Or, you know,
21	something along that line.
22	Or just, or even a fun day family

1	supper night, so we're having a community dinner
2	outside under the stars.
3	MS. JONES: That would be nice. Yeah.
4	MS. BUNN: For a beautiful summer
5	night. You know, with people. You know, and we
6	purposely sit people that don't live, you know,
7	don't know each other. Just to kind of get to
8	know each other.
9	MS. JONES: And some of the things
10	that people were seeing, so this is who we are
11	along
12	MS. BUNN: Yeah, yeah. Yeah, just
13	that.
14	MR. PARKS: Okay. Thank you all for
15	coming.
16	MS. JONES: Good job James.
17	MR. PARKS: Just please send me those
18	notes.
19	MS. JONES: I'll just send you like
20	those. We've got some good stuff.
21	MR. PARKS: Um-hum. Um-hum. Latrene
22	couldn't join us tonight. She had a small

1	emergency. She couldn't join us.
2	But, she sends here regards.
3	MS. JONES: Okay.
4	MR. PARKS: And we'll be back May 12.
5	MS. JONES: May 12. All right.
6	MR. PARKS: But don't wait until then.
7	(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
8	went off the record at 7:32 p.m.)
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
